





We had a beautiful autumn day in mid-October for the Sonoma tour with clear and sunny skies. We met at Sonoma Valley Bagel on Rohnert Park Expressway; well, let's say that most of us met there but a few members including our 2 VPs went to another Sonoma Valley Bagel shop in RP. 
### MOSS BEACH DISTILLERY

A short drive from multiple locations, followed by a display of our cats in the parking lot and then a delicious brunch in the Fitzgerald Room, with spectacular ocean views. We will meet at four Bay Area locations to caravan to the Moss Beach Distillery located at 140 Beach Way, Moss Beach. During Prohibition it was an ideal spot for rum running and bootleggers and became a 'speakeasy" establishment. The restaurant is located on a cliff above a secluded beach with fabulous views. It is also famous both because mystery writer Dashiell Hammett was a frequent visitor and used it as a setting for his detective stories and because long time JAG member Bernie Stein worked there in his teens! We will assemble in the parking lot south of the entrance by 11:00 to exhibit our CATS and socialize with brunch starting at 11:30. The brunch includes:

- > Coffee or tea and soft drinks

## 2025 South West Colorado Oil Leak: A Week of Scenic Drives and Jaguar Camaraderie

In late September, J.A.G. members David and Debbie Langley, Glen and Sharon Barker, Phil Endliss, and Les Hamilton took part in the 2025 South West Colorado Oil Leak, an event planned and led by David Langley. This gathering was not just about driving; it was a celebration of tradition, camaraderie, and the love of Jaguars.

The Oil Leak event began in 2011 when a group of Jaguar E-Type enthusiasts organized a road trip to mark the E-Type's 50th anniversary. What started as a single celebration has grown into an annual tradition, with planning duties and destinations rotating each year. In 2025, the event was based in Durango and Montrose, Colorado, with participants spending three nights in each location.

This year's timing coincided with the peak of Colorado's fall colors and allowed for less crowded venues. Twenty-one participants, driving eleven Jaguars, gathered in Durango. The lineup included two XK-120s, five E-Types, two XK8s, and two F-Types, with attendees traveling from California, Washington, Oregon, Arizona, and Oklahoma. Many groups drove more than 1,000 miles to reach the starting point in Durango.

### Day 1: Mesa Verde National Park

Given the long journeys many participants had undertaken, the first day featured a short drive to Mesa Verde National Park, located just 35 miles away. The day began with a minor setback when the newly restored white XK120 experienced a charging issue, necessitating a quick return to Durango for a replacement alternator.

Upon arrival at Mesa Verde, the group split up to explore the park's renowned cliff dwellings. Built by the Pueblo people in the late 1200s, these structures are remarkable feats of engineering, constructed without metal tools and tucked beneath cliff overhangs. Some participants viewed the dwellings from overlooks, while others joined guided tours. With so much to see, a single day could not do the park full justice.

The evening concluded at the Diamond Belle Saloon, where members enjoyed drinks, dinner, lively conversation, and the unmistakable sound of an out-of-tune honky-tonk piano.

### Day 2: San Juan Skyway Scenic Byway

The second day was dedicated to the San Juan Skyway, a scenic 230-mile loop through the San Juan Mountains. The group started on US-160 and continued on CO-184 and 145, where the route wound through grasslands and the Dolores River valley before ascending to the first glimpses of the golden Colorado Aspens.

Lunch was served at an exotic car storage facility near Telluride. After a brief visit to Telluride, the journey continued east on CO-62 and south on US-550, passing through Ridgway and Ouray. The stretch from Ouray, marking the northern end of the Million Dollar Highway, offered dramatic mountain scenery, switchbacks, and steep, unprotected sections with breathtaking views. The drive descended into Silverton for a coffee break before returning to Durango, slowed occasionally by construction, which provided time for photos and windshield cleaning.

### Day 3: Durango to Montrose

Wednesday's route took the group from Durango to Montrose, about 100 miles to the north. Retracing the Million Dollar Highway in reverse, participants enjoyed new perspectives of the rugged landscape and vivid aspens, pausing again for roadwork. After lunch in Ouray, two route options were possible: a direct drive to Montrose or a more scenic 200-mile journey through Gateway. Most of our party chose the scenic route, heading west on CO-62 and soaking in additional views of the San Juan Mountains.

The twisty road passed through wooded canyons, ideal for spirited driving. After Placerville, we followed CO-145, stopping at Naturita for fuel and a break. Continuing along the Unaweep Tabeguache Scenic Byway, the drive traced the Dolores River's dramatic canyon through red sandstone. The route then veered into Unaweep Canyon, with its striking grey rock walls, before joining US-50 for the final leg to Montrose. The day concluded with dinner at a local steakhouse and a review of the day's highlights.

### Day 4: Black Canyon of the Gunnison

Thursday's itinerary featured a visit to Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park and a scenic drive. Entering the park, the group observed the aftermath of a recent wildfire—blackened vegetation alongside signs of regrowth. The park's dramatic landscape was shaped over millions of years by uplift, volcanic activity, and the relentless erosive force of the Gunnison River, which carved the steep, narrow canyon.

Members explored the South Rim, stopping at overlooks and hiking short trails to the canyon's edge for breathtaking views. Some areas were closed due to wildfire damage.

Leaving the park, the drive continued east on US-50 along the Gunnison River, crossing Blue Mesa Dam, then west on CO-92 along the Black Canyon's north rim. At Pioneer Point, the group enjoyed a picnic lunch before some returned to Montrose and others continued along the scenic, winding road.

During this segment, the white XK-120 DHC broke its custom alternator mount. Glen and Sharon Barker took the part to a local welder, and repairs were completed by day's end. Thursday night was Pizza Night, a tradition for the Oil Leak event. The group took over the Holiday Inn patio in Montrose for pizza, drinks, laughter, and discussions about plans for 2026.

### Day 5: Colorado National Monument and Grand Mesa

The final day included a visit to Colorado National Monument and a scenic drive to Grand Mesa. The monument features striking red rock formations and expansive canyon views. The group drove 60 miles north on US-50 to Grand Junction and entered the park, where we saw Bighorn sheep navigating the cliffs. The drive along Rim Rock Drive atop the mesa offered more panoramic vistas.

During this leg, one E-Type FHC was found to have a failed brake fluid pressure sender, and another 1969 E-Type OTS suffered a blown fuse affecting multiple systems. Both issues were promptly repaired, and the group continued to lunch in Fruita before heading east on I-70 toward Grand Mesa.

Grand Mesa, with over 300 lakes and spanning more than 500 square miles, rises to 10,000 feet and is covered in aspen and pine forests. The group traveled the Grand Mesa Scenic Byway (CO-65), a 63-mile route with remarkable views, ascending from 4,500 feet to the plateau. The temperature dropped by 20 degrees at the summit, which is dotted with lakes. The vivid aspens recalled the scenery of the Million Dollar Highway, and the group agreed that a future visit would be worthwhile.

Descending from Grand Mesa, the group traveled through Delta and returned to Montrose for a final dinner together. After dinner, members exchanged farewells in the parking lot, concluding a memorable week of driving, sightseeing, and forging new friendships.

### Conclusion

Three cars remained for the Telluride Concours the following day, while Phil Endliss and Les Hamilton began their two-day drive home. Upon returning to Menlo Park, Phil's XK8 had accumulated more than 3,500 miles during the journey—a fitting testament to a week of unforgettable experiences and Jaguar spirit.


